We are about to enter the season of advent which is the beginning of the church year and a time to focus on how it was that the birth of Jesus came about.

These winter days, mornings are dark, afternoons are short, nights are long and it can feel like the world is closing in, that nature is closing down. Crossreach



Born and brought up in the village of Kilbarchan worshipping with my parents at the Memorial Hall (Christian Brethren) I attended Kilbarchan Primary then Johnstone High School. On leaving school worked as a travel agent with OSA Tours 74 Causeyside Street, Paisley and later managed their branch office in Johnstone. I became a member, then elder at Kilbarchan West Church. Along with local youth fellowships from around the area we took over the Kelburne Cinema to raise money for Christian Aid in a concert featuring local Paisley gospel band The Concords

1969 I married Joan Parr (who once worked in the nearby Douglas Street Nursery) and also in that year I started to study at Glasgow University in preparation for the ministry. Served an "apprenticeship" with Rev Peter Houston in Renfrew Old then to my first and only charge on 5th August 1975 and retiring on 30th June 2012. Thirty-seven wonderful years for Joan, my two boys Derek and Andrew and myself. Whether it was wonderful for Bonhill... you would have to ask them!
